Course title	Energy Democracy: A Seminar on Social Theory and Practice

Number of ECTS credits	5
Course objective	This class addresses complex dynamics present in attempts to change the world's energy infrastructure from one dominated by fossil fuels to one dominated by renewable energy sources in order to address energy demand in the face of climate change. The course focuses specifically on energy democracy social movements attempting to promote energy infrastructure change in a just and equitable manner. In this course, students will gain: (1) Use of democratic and communication theories to inform practice; (2) Evaluation techniques for researching energy system discourse and the effectiveness of energy democracy campaigns to inform decision-making; (3) Skills to analyze energy related decision-making processes; and (4) Skills to analyze stakeholder engagement and energy imaginaries emerging in the discourse.
