Course title Introduction to Ethics (With a Special Focus on Social Work Ethics)

Course number 0143

Hours per week (SWS) 2

Number of ECTS credits 5 (for a 2-course module)

Course objective The focus of this course is on practising methodology, argumentation and reflection. We will practice

the English language in numerous discussions of practical cases from various areas, not only from Social Work. The course is thus addressed at students of all subject areas who are interested in a

general introduction to ethics and who like discussing moral problems.

Prerequisites Basic command of English and interest in discussions of moral problems

Course content In this introductory course to ethics, we first consider what a moral problem is, and what we (should)

understand by 'morality' and 'ethics', before working through the main features of normative ethical theories using a variety of practical examples. These include,e.g., virtue ethics, consequentialist ethics, and the group of approaches usually referred to as deontological ethics. The 'big names' whose texts are considered in extracts or summaries include Aristotle, Immanuel Kant, Jeremy Bentham and John Stuart Mill. The fact that ethics is anything but 'grey theory' will be demonstrated through numerous

discussions and real-life examples (including, but not limited to, social work settings).

**Remarks** This course is conducted in English. Nevertheless, it is possible to deliver certain parts in German,

including the assessment (Leistungsnachweis).
